

DOING THE ROUNDS

THE legacy of William Waldegrave's absurd waiting list initiative lives on. Surgeons at Bath's Royal United Hospital have been ordered to clear their "over two years" waiting lists for varicose veins and in-growing toenails in preference to removing "urgent" breast lumps (ie proven cancers and highly suspicious growths).

Surgical manager Janet Christopher told irate consultants: "If you don't comply, you'll be fined £16,000... which happens to be the salary of one of your junior doctors." The RUH is so in debt that it has closed three wards and has designs on a fourth.

 SWINDON health authority is reviewing its discharge procedures following complaints about the treatment of an elderly woman. She was admitted to Princess Margaret Hospital with abdominal pain and later discharged home alone without support or her family's knowledge.

A diagnosis of terminal cancer was made two weeks later but was overlooked and she was subjected to unnecessary bowel preparation for colonoscopy. The relatives were not informed of the diagnosis for three weeks, shortly before her death. Their complaints took a mere 18 months to be investigated.

- THE Royal Sussex County Hospital in **Brighton** indulges in the rather dubious habit of videoing all cases of major trauma in its casualty department. Junior doctors are expected to converse with the camera during resuscitation and the tapes, recorded without the patients' or relatives' consent, are supposed to be erased shortly afterwards. However, many are being kept for teaching and medico-legal purposes.
- THE sorry state of paediatric cardiac surgery at the United Bristol Healthcare Trust (Eye 793, 797) has been confirmed by an internal audit of the last two years' operations. The results of procedures to correct two congenital heart abnormalities (Tetrallogy of Fallot and transposition of the arteries) were especially poor.

James Wishart, chairman of the hospital management committee and medical adviser to the trust board, is required to maintain standards of medical practice at UBHT. Curiously he has not felt it necessary to inform the trust board or the trust's purchasers of these findings. Could it be because he is also associate director of cardiac surgery?

Meanwhile UBHT continues to squander its resources in pitiful attempts to buy staff loyalty. Every junior doctor was recently given a brand new leather filofax and Parker pen, complete with he UBHT crest and slogan.

■ WESSEX regional health authority has unnounced the wastage of at least £20 million on iseless computer projects. Ken Jarrold, regional general manager, said it was hard to say exactly now much of the £42 million "regional information ystems plan" (RISP) was worthwhile because fundamental mismanagement makes it impossible o know how much was spent, by whom and for vhat."

Those responsible for instigating RISP no onger work for Wessex RHA, but their main folly as to farm out the region's computing services to private company coincidentally formed and affed by ex-Wessex RHA employees. The uditors considered this subverted the interests of ne authority "deliberately or otherwise".

Wessex RHA is also heading the national "bail ut a fund-holding GP" competition. It has had to ive extra funds to each of its 17 impecunious rst-wave fundholders totalling £378,300. So far 2 of the country's 14 RHA's have had to top up ich practices.

THE department of health has also been forced bail out the Wellhouse NHS Trust (aka ihithouse Trust", Eye 801), which encompasses

Edgware and Barnet general hospitals and their projected £5.3 million debt. Barnet has shed 84 jobs and is closing three wards including Simpson, a busy acute surgical ward, and the geniatric day hospital. Compulsory redundancies are foremost among the over 50s, many of whom have worked in the hospital for years and were given very little notice. Meanwhile the number of patients waiting more than two years for operations in the North West Thames RHA rose from just two before the election to 155 two months after it.

• IN NORTHUMBERLAND, the opening of Wansbeck Hospital will be heralded by a specially commissioned song. The £10,000 cost will cover the composer's fee, though many would rather the money was donated to the hospital's CAT scanner appeal. At present, patients have to travel to Newcastle for scans. However, Mr Frank Ward, one of the health chiefs working on the new hospital, insists there is not "a cat in hell's chance" of the money being transferred.

 SOMERSET'S hospitals are reaping the rewards of trust status. Both Yeovil and Taunton are £200,000 overspent just four months into the financial year. Between 1974 and 1986 (before the reforms) the whole of Somerset was well managed to the point that there was never an overspend in any one year. Since taking on the trust mantle, Taunton hospital has squandered £5 million on computer hardware, operators, clerks, information gatherers, patients' charter-minders, facilitators and quality control managers. The management executive has now concluded that "activity within the trust is considerably higher than planned or funded and cannot be allowed to continue unchecked..." They are now refusing to employ bank nurses, leaving some wards dangerously understaffed.

● IN BRISTOL'S Southmead NHS Trust, chief executive Philip Chubb has come up with a novel solution to the chronic shortage of medical house-officers (Eyes 797, 800): he's decided to transfer two house surgeons to the medical side as from 1 August 1993. This is likely to precipitate a similar manpower crisis on the surgical side. The director of surgery, Humphrey White M. Chir FRCS, has now joined the director of medicine in resignation.


UN NEWS
